Heinrich Schütz and his contemporaries

Conductor and tutor: Philip Thorby

Heinrich Schütz (1585 –1672) was a German composer and organist, generally regarded as the most important German composer before Johann Sebastian Bach and often considered to be one of the most important composers of the 17th century along with Claudio Monteverdi. We shall be studying sacred settings, including some of Schütz’s polychoral music.

Philip Thorby is well known as a performer, teacher and conductor of renaissance and baroque music. He has played, broadcast and recorded with many of London’s leading baroque orchestras and renaissance ensembles. In addition to his work at Trinity Laban Conservatoire , where he is Professor of Recorder and Emeritus Fellow, he teaches widely in England and abroad.
